PURPOSE OF THIS LEGISLATION:

to amend the Tobacco Products Tax to increase the tax rate, to enact a new Electronic Smoking Products Act, and to establish a Fund for the Navajo Department of Health.

FINAL AUTHORITY and VOTE REQUIREMENT:

The Navajo Nation Council has final authority. A simple majority vote is required.

19	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY	
20	A. The Health, Education, and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council is	
21	empowered to establish Navajo Nation policy, promulgate rules and regulations governing	
22	health, social services, education, human services, and general government services of the	
23	Navajo Nation and its tribal organizations, entities, and enterprises, among other duties and	
24	responsibilities. 2 N.N.C. §40l(B)(l).	
25	B. The Law and Order Committee of the Navajo Nation Council reviews and makes	
26	recommendations to the Navajo Nation Council on proposed amendments to the Navajo	
27	Nation Code. 2 N.N.C. §60l(B)(l4).	
28	C. The Budget and Finance Committee of the Navajo Nation Council "coordinate[s] and	
29	review[s] all fiscal, financial and investment activities of the Navajo Nation and its	
30	enterprises, as well as other agencies, federal, state, regional and private, expending or	
30	Chiciphises, as well as outer agentices, reactan, state, regional and private, superiors	

- seeking to expend funds within the Navajo Nation or for the benefit of the Navajo People."

- D. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council reviews proposed resolutions requiring final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(9).
 - E. The Navajo Nation Council, as the governing body of the Navajo Nation, sets policy for the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §102(A).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. Research shows that taxing commercial tobacco products is one of the most effective ways to reduce commercial tobacco use, especially among youth and young adults. See "The Economic Analysis of Substance Use and Abuse: An Integration of Econometric and Behavioral Economic Research." Bickel, W.K., *et al.* (2009), University of Chicago Press 2009.
- B. According to the "Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report" dated April 15, 2016, issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC"), electronic cigarettes or vaping products have been the most used commercial tobacco product among youth. From 2011 to 2015, 16% of U.S. high school students and 5.3% of middle school students reported the use of electronic cigarettes or vaping products within the past 30 days of the study.
- C. According to the 2017 Navajo Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 41% of high school students reported having smoked cigarettes in their lifetime. In addition, 40% of high school students reported having used electronic cigarettes or vaping products in their lifetime. Furthermore, 11% of Navajo high school students reported using smokeless tobacco products compared to the U.S. national high school use at 3.1% (reported by the CDC in December 18, 2020).
- D. The number of youths who have used electronic cigarettes or vaping products at least once will increase in their subsequent experience by a factor of three. These same youth are identified as not experiencing cigarette use. Youth identified as never having smoked a cigarette but using electronic cigarettes or vaping products may be more likely to smoke conventional cigarettes than "never smokers" who have not used electronic cigarettes or vaping products. 12	G. The Navajo Nation finds it is in the best interests of the Navajo Nation to amend Title 24 of
13	the Navajo Nation Code to increase the tax on tobacco products and electronic smoking
14	products. These changes may result in a healthier population while reducing overall health
15	costs and mortality rates.

17	SECTION THREE. AMENDING THE TOBACCO PRODUCTS TAX AT 24 N.N.C.
18	§800 <i>ET SEQ</i> .
19	The Navajo Nation Council hereby amends Title 24, Chapter 8 of the Navajo Nation Code. as
20	follows:
21	TITLE 24. Taxation
22	Chapter 8 Tobacco Products Tax
23	
24	§ 800 SHORT TITLE.
25	This Chapter shall be called the "Tobacco Products Tax Act."
26	
27	§ 801 ADMINISTRATION.
28	The provisions of Chapter 1, the Uniform Tax Administration Statute, shall apply to this
29	Chapter. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission is charged with the administration of this
	Act. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission shall retain five percent (5%) of all tax revenue

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§ 802 DEFINITIONS.

- Subject to additional definitions (if any) contained in the subsequent sections of this Chapter, and unless the context otherwise requires, in this Chapter:
 - 1. "Tobacco" means commercially cultivated tobacco, the leaves of which are processed chiefly for use in cigarettes, cigars, snuff, plug or chewing tobacco, or for smoking in pipes.
 - 2. "Tobacco product" means any commercially processed and/or manufactured product for human consumption which contains tobacco, including cigarettes.
 - 3. "Distributor" means any person within the Navajo Nation who manufactures, produces, ships, transports, or imports tobacco products into the Navajo Nation or in any manner acquires or possesses tobacco products for the purpose of making the first sale.
 - 4. "First sale" means the first sale or distribution within the Navajo Nation or the first use or consumption of tobacco products within the Navajo Nation.
 - 5. "Retailer" means any person engaged in the sale or resale of tobacco products within the Navajo Nation.
 - 6. "Sale" means a transfer of possession or ownership between buyer and seller for a consideration.
 - 7. "Consumer" means any person who comes into possession or ownership of a tobacco product by purchasing or otherwise acquiring it for the purpose of using, consuming, or giving away such product.
 - 8. "Period" means one calendar month.

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§ 803 TAX IMPOSED - RATES.

- There is hereby levied and imposed by Chapter for each period a tax upon the first sale by any retailer or distributor of tobacco products. The tax rates shall be established in regulations. Until other rates are established, the following rates shall apply:
 - 1. On each cigarette, five cents (5ϕ) twelve and one-half cents (12.5ϕ) ;
 - 2. On smoking tobacco, snuff, chewing tobacco, cut and granulated tobacco, shorts and

refuse or fine cut tobacco, refuse, scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco, excluding tobacco powder or tobacco products used exclusively for agricultural or horticultural purposes and unfit for human consumption, eleven and three-tenths cents (11.3¢) per ounce or major fraction thereof three dollars and eighty-five cents (\$3.85) per ounce or major fraction thereof;

- 3. On all Cavendish, plug or twist tobacco, two and eight-tenths one dollar and twenty-five cents (2.8¢)(\$1.25) per ounce or fractional part thereof; or, if packaged for sale to a consumer in a package of less than 1.2 ounces, at the minimum rate of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) per package. When more than one package subject to tax under this paragraph is packaged together, each package shall be taxed separately;
- 4. On each twenty small cigars or fractional part thereof weighing not more than three pounds per thousand, twenty-two-and three-tenths two dollars and fifty cents (22.3¢ \$2.50);
- 5. On cigars of all descriptions except those included in paragraph 4 of this Subsection, made of tobacco or any substitute therefore, if manufactured to retail at not more than five (5¢) cents each, eleven cents (11¢) on each three dollars and sixty-two cents (\$3.62) on each cigar; but if manufactured to retail at more than five (5¢) cents each, four and four-tenths (4.4¢) cents on each cigar.
- 6. On any other tobacco product not subject to tax under the preceding paragraphs 1-5, 22% of the retail price.

§ 804 LEGAL INCIDENCE.

The tax imposed by this Chapter Act is presumed to be a direct tax on retailers and distributors of commercially processed and/or manufactured tobacco products.

§ 805 LIABILITY FOR REMITTANCE AND PAYMENT OF TAX.

Distributors and retailers are responsible for the collection and remittance of the tax imposed under this Chapter. Distributors and retailers are liable for taxes regardless of whether the taxes are collected from the consumer.

1	§ 806 LICENSING.
2	All distributors and retailers licensed by Arizona, Utah, or New Mexico shall provide the Office
3	of the Navajo Tax Commission with a copy of their state license.
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5	§ 807 RESERVED.
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7	§ 808 USE OF FUNDS.
8	Tax, interest, and penalties collected by the Office of the Navajo Tax Commission pursuant to
9	this Chapter shall be deposited in the General Fund of the Navajo Nation.
10	A. After mandatory allocations of tax revenue as required by Navajo Nation law, all tax, interest
11	and penalties collected by the Office of the Navajo Tax Commission pursuant to this Chapter
12	shall be deposited into a special account for use by the Navajo Department of Health
13	("DOH") or its subordinate offices, in compliance with a Fund Management Plan that shall
14	be approved by the Budget and Finance Committee. No funds so deposited shall be expended
15	unless in compliance with the approved Fund Management Plan.
16	B. The Fund Management Plan shall include provisions stating as follows:
17	1. 20% of the net revenue received by DOH shall be used for projects or purposes carried
18	out by traditional Navajo healer non-profit organizations that are Priority-Certified under
19	5 N.N.C. §204(A)(1) (Priority One) or under §204(A)(2) (Priority Two); and
20	2. 80% of the net revenue shall be provided to the Office of Traditional Cultural and Spiritua
21	Healing ("OTCSH") for its use:
22	a. in leveraging funds or satisfying matching funds requirements to secure funds from
23	non-Navajo Nation government sources; and/or
24	b. for projects or purposes carried out by the OTCSH to improve the well-being of the
25	Navajo People by preserving traditional Navajo cultural teachings and practices.
26	3. OTCSH shall enter into contracts with individuals or entities to carry out or manage its
27	projects, so long as those individuals or entities are Priority-Certified under 5 N.N.C.
28	§ 204(A)(1) (Priority One) or under § 204(A)(2) (Priority Two).
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1	§ 809 EFFECTIVE DATE.
2	The tax imposed by this Chapter shall be effective as of the date of adoption by the Navajo
3	Nation Council and in accordance with 2 N.N.C. §1005.
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5	§ 810 SEVERABILITY.
6	If any provision of this Chapter, as amended, or its application to any person or circumstance,
7	is held invalid by a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity shall not
8	affect other provisions or applications of this Chapter which can be given effect without the
9	invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Chapter are severable.
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11	SECTION FOUR. ENACTING THE ELECTRONIC SMOKING PRODUCTS ACT
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13	TITLE 24. Taxation
14	Chapter 10 Fuel Distributor's Licensing Act [Repealed]
15	Electronic Smoking Products Tax
16	
17	The Navajo Nation Council hereby amends Title 24, Chapter 10 of the Navajo Nation Code to
18	enact the Electronic Smoking Products Tax as follows:
19	
20	§ 1001 SHORT TITLE.
21	The tax imposed by this Chapter shall be called the "Electronic Smoking Products Tax."
22	
23	§ 1002 PURPOSE.
24	The Navajo Nation Council hereby enacts this tax for the privilege of engaging in business
25	activity within the Navajo Nation, and for purposes of defraying necessary governmental
26	expenses incurred in providing for the public welfare.
27	
28	§ 1003 TAX IMPOSED.
29	A tax is hereby imposed on the Gross Receipts of a Person. The tax due for a Period is
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30	determined by first calculating applicable gross receipts from all Electronic Smoking Products

sold for a Period, and then multiplying those Gross Receipts from all Electronic Smoking 1 2 Products sold by the applicable tax rate. 3 § 1004 LEGAL INCIDENCE AND RESPONSIBILITY FOR PAYMENT. 4 5 The Person liable for the payment of the tax imposed by this Chapter is the Person receiving the Gross Receipts from a Sale of Electronic Smoking Products. 6 7 § 1005 RATE OF TAX. 8 The tax imposed by this Chapter is imposed at a rate of twenty-two percent (22%) of a Person's 9 Electronic Smoking Products Gross Receipts. 10 11 § 1006 ADMINISTRATION. 12 The provisions of Chapter 1, the Uniform Tax Administration Statute, shall apply to this 13 Chapter. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission is charged with the administration of this 14 15 tax. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission shall retain five percent (5%) of all tax revenue collected under this Chapter as a fee to offset the costs of administration. 16 17 § 1007 DEFINITIONS. 18 Subject to additional definitions contained in Title 24, Chapter 6, Sales Tax, the following 19 20 definitions apply to this Chapter: 1. "Electronic Smoking Product" means any device that can deliver aerosolized or 21 vaporized nicotine to the person inhaling from the device, including, but not limited to, an 22 e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, vape pen, or e-hookah. Electronic Smoking Product includes 23 any component, part, or accessory of such a device, whether or not sold separately. It 24 includes any substance intended to be aerolized or vaporized during the use of the device, 25 whether or not the substance contains nicotine. An electronic smoking device includes no 26 battery or battery charger when sold separately. In addition, Electronic Smoking Product 27 does not include drugs, devices, or combination products authorized for sale by the U.S. 28 Food and Drug Administration, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and

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Cosmetic Act.

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2. "Person" as defined in the Uniform Tax Administration Statute, shall include any organization, whether a sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, trust, estate, unincorporated association, company, corporation, or government (other than the Navajo Nation government), or any part, division, or agency of any of the foregoing, and an individual or group of individuals. In accordance with Section 1009 of this Chapter, "person" for purposes of the Electronic Smoking Products Tax shall include the government of the Navajo Nation and any wholly owned subdivision or Enterprise of the Navajo Nation government.

§ 1008 NAVAJO NATION GOVERNMENT.

- A. Sales by corporations owned by the Navajo Nation government or any political subdivision thereof shall be fully subject to the tax imposed by this Chapter.
 - B. Sales by the government of the Navajo Nation, or political subdivision or Enterprises thereof, shall be subject to the tax imposed by this Chapter.

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§ 1009 EXEMPTIONS AND EXCLUSIONS.

- A. The tax imposed by this Chapter does not apply to Gross Receipts generated directly by the following:
 - 1. Sales for resale;
 - 2. Sales related to agriculture, farming, or livestock activities conducted within the Navajo Nation
 - 3. Sales, other than Sales from an unrelated trade or business as defined in §511 §513 of the Internal Revenue Code, by any person operating exclusively for non-profit or charitable purposes, and recognized as such pursuant to §501(C)(3) and §501(C)(19) of the United States Internal Revenue Code at the time of the sale.
 - 4. Sales by hospital and health-care organizations or facilities such as nursing care institutions, residential care and mental health facilities, senior citizen care facilities or retirement homes, kidney dialysis facilities and blood banks, or other facilities which provide medical care and services.

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1 § 1010 FILING A RETURN. 2 A. Each Person must file a return indicating all sales from applicable gross receipts and the tax due under this Chapter for each Period by the fifteenth day of the second month after the end 3 4 of each calendar quarter. Returns are due on February 15, May 15, August 15, and November 5 15 of each calendar year. 6 B. The Commission may by form or regulation require that other information, records or 7 relevant documents which it deems necessary for the proper and efficient administration of this Chapter be included with the return and signed by a specified individual. 8 9 C. No return need be filed by any Person who is exempt under Section 1009, provided that the 10 Office of the Navajo Tax Commission may require such Person to file the information 11 necessary to establish its exempt status. 12 § 1011 PAYMENT OF TAX. 13 Payment in full of the taxes owed for a particular Period is due on the same date that the 14 completed return for that same Period is due. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission, 15 however, may require payment of any taxes due on a monthly basis. 16 17 § 1012 RECORDKEEPING. 18 19 A. Each Person shall keep all records which pertain to or relate in any manner to all sales from any business activity engaged in at any time by such Person. Such records shall be maintained 20 separately for each reporting Period during which a Person is engaged in business activity. 21 B. Records required to be kept must be preserved for four years beyond the end of the Period 22 23 for which the records relate. 24 § 1013 ALLOCATION OF REVENUE. 25 After mandatory allocations of tax revenue as required by Navajo Nation law, all tax, interest, 26 and penalties collected by the Office of the Navajo Tax Commission from this Act shall be 27 deposited into the special account established in 24 N.N.C. §808. 28

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ı	§ 1014 NO CONFLICT WITH LOCAL GOVERNANCE ACT.
2	The provisions of this Chapter and corresponding regulations shall not be construed to affect
3	any governmental authority under the Local Governance Act, 26 N.N.C. §1 - §2008.
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5	§ 1015 SEVERABILITY.
6	If any provision of this Chapter, as amended, or its application to any person or circumstance,
7	is held invalid by a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity shall not
8	affect other provisions or applications of the Chapter which can be given effect without the
9	invalid provision or application, and to this end, the provisions of this Chapter are severable.
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11	§ 1016 REPEALS.
12	All laws or parts of laws (or attachments thereto) which are inconsistent with the provisions of
13	this Chapter are hereby repealed, including, without limitation, any law purporting to waive any
14	right of taxation by the Navajo Nation.
15	
16	SECTION FIVE. EFFECTIVE DATE
17	This Act shall become effective as provided in 2 N.N.C. §221(B), 2 N.N.C. §1005(C)(10), and
18	2 N.N.C. §164(A)(17).
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20	SECTION SIX. SAVING CLAUSE
21	If any portion of this Act is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a
22	District Court of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the
23	remainder of this Act shall be the law of the Navajo Nation.
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25	SECTION SEVEN. CODIFICATION
26	The provisions of this Act which amend or enact new sections of the Navajo Nation Code shall
27	be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel.





Supporting and Approving the Proposed Legislation entitled "AMENDMENT OF THE NAVAJO NATION COMMERCIAL TOBACCO TAX OF 2023" led by the Navajo Nation Air is Life Health Coalition.

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to CMY-23-79, the Many Farms Chapter is a certified chapter of the Navajo Nation vested with authority and responsibilities to provide and enact on all matters affecting the community; and
- 2. Pursuant to CAP-34-98, the Navajo Nation Council approved the Navajo Nation Local Governance Act (LGA) that allows Many Farms Chapter to make decisions over local matters; and
- 3. The purpose of the legislation is to increase taxation on all commercial tobacco products and to include electronic tobacco products in the Navajo Nation. And
- 4. Navajo Nation finds that commercial tobacco tax increases are one of the most effective ways to reduce commercial tobacco smoking and other commercial tobacco use, especially among youth and young adults; and
- 5. Navajo Nation recognizes studies find that an increment of a ten percent increase in cigarette prices reduces smoking among youth by an average seven percent and total cigarette consumption by four percent; and
- 6. Navajo Nation finds that higher taxes on smokeless tobacco will reduce its use, particularly among young males; and increasing cigar prices through tax increases will reduce youth and adult cigar smoking, resulting in a healthier population while reducing overall health costs and mortality rates; and
- 7. The Navajo Nation finds that higher taxes on commercial tobacco will result in a healthier population while reducing overall health costs and mortality rates for Navajo Nation; and
- 8. The Navajo Nation recognizes the 2017 Navajo Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 41 percent of high school students reported having smoked cigarettes in their lifetime. In addition, 40 percent of high school students reported having used e-cigarette products in their lifetime. Furthermore, 11 percent of Navajo high school students reported using smokeless tobacco products compared to the U.S. national high school use at 3.1 percent; and
- 9. Navajo Nation finds the tobacco companies have promoted the sales of commercial tobacco products to tribal communities for decades, especially toward our youth and young adults, which has resulted in American Indians and Alaskan Natives having the highest rates of smoking compared to any other ethnic group in the U.S.; and

- 10. Navajo Nation finds the use of commercial tobacco products is harmful to Diné, especially Diné children and young adults. The use of commercial tobacco products is disrespectful to the Diné fundamental traditions and thus harms our health and wellbeing resulting in disharmony with the mind, body, and spirit; and
- 11. The Navajo Nation is committed to improving the health and welfare of the people living in the Navajo Nation, to promoting a healthy environment, and has an obligation to enact policies that protect people from harm.

As an organization dedicated to advocating for public polices to end cancer as we know it for everyone, I'm writing today on behalf of the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN), the nonprofit, non-partisan advocacy affiliate of the American Cancer Society, in support of 0145-24 to amend the tobacco products tax and enact the electronic smoking products tax. ACS CAN strongly supports 0145-24 which would improve health by reducing commercial tobacco use. It would increase the tax on cigarettes by \$1.50 per pack as well as increase the tax on other commercial tobacco products and establish a tax on e-cigarettes to which would generate revenue, protect kids, and save lives. Additionally, the bill would invest revenue from commercial tobacco taxes in the Department of Health.

Significantly increasing tobacco taxes and investing in tobacco prevention and cessation programs saves lives, reduces health care costs and generates revenue. In fact, it is one of the most effective ways to prevent youth from starting to use tobacco and encourage those already addicted to quit.

Smoking harms nearly every organ in the body and increases the risk for many types of cancer, heart attack, stroke, COPD, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, and other diseases. The good news is we have decades of data showing us that tobacco taxes work to reduce commercial tobacco use, including the U. S. Surgeon General Report, *The Health Consequences of Smoking – 50 years of Progress* which concluded that increases in the price of tobacco products, including those resulting from excise tax increases, prevent initiation of tobacco use, promote cessation, and reduce the prevalence and intensity of tobacco use among youth and adults. This conclusion reaffirms findings from previous Surgeon General's reports on commercial tobacco use that raising the price of tobacco is one of the most effective commercial tobacco prevention and control strategies, and that increasing the price of cigarettes and tobacco products decreases the prevalence of commercial tobacco use, particularly among youth and young adults. He provided the provided tobacco use, particularly among youth and young adults.

A \$1.50 per pack increase in Navajo Nation's cigarette tax, as proposed in this legislation, would prevent 1,100 Navajo youth from becoming adults who smoke commercial tobacco, help 500 adults who smoke commercial tobacco quit, and save 410 lives. Additionally, this cigarette tax increase will save Navajo Nation \$41.7 million in long term health care costs. Increasing the tax on all other tobacco products at the same time would produce additional health and economic benefits for Navajo Nation. ACS CAN calls on you to increase the cigarette tax by \$1.50 per pack with a parallel tax on all other commercial tobacco products in order to provide a substantial source of revenue while reducing tobacco use and tobacco-related health care costs.

It is important that all other tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, are taxed to parallel the new cigarette tax rate in order to encourage people who use commercial tobacco to quit rather than switching to lower-taxed, lower-cost products. If all commercial tobacco products are not taxed at an equivalent rate, Navajo Nation can expect to see diminished positive outcomes for both revenue and public health. We should not allow such highly addictive products to avoid being taxed at the same rate as cigarettes.

In closing, from the cancer control perspective, the status quo that perpetuates preventable tobacco-related death and disease is unacceptable. The relatively low price of tobacco products makes it too easy for youth to afford to start smoking and continue smoking, and current tobacco tax rates do little to defray the enormous societal cost commercial tobacco products have on health and the economy. If we are serious about reducing the toll of preventable cancer and chronic disease, a high-impact commercial tobacco tax increase such as this will help achieve that life-saving mission.


We urge you to vote "yes" on 0145-24 to increase the cigarette tax by \$1.50 per pack, increase the tax on all other commercial tobacco products as well as establish a tax on e-cigarettes, and invest in the health department in order to generate revenue, protect kids, and save lives.





Dear Honorable Council Delegate Slater:

The Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids strongly supports the "Amendment of the Navajo Nation Commercial Tobacco Tax of 2023," led by the Air is Life Health Coalition. The Campaign stands behind these efforts to enhance the wellbeing of Navajo communities. The intent of the Amendment of the Navajo Nation Commercial Tobacco Tax of 2023 legislation is to increase excise taxes for all commercial tobacco products on the Navajo Nation. Decades of evidence shows that increasing the price of commercial tobacco products is one of the most effective ways to reduce smoking, especially among youth.

Fifty years after the first Surgeon General's report on smoking and health, the 2014 Surgeon General's Report, *The Health Consequences of Smoking—50 Years of Progress*, found that, "Raising prices on cigarettes is one of the most effective tobacco control interventions." In fact, increasing taxes on commercial tobacco products is a win-win proposition: a financial win and a health win. For example, significantly increasing cigarette taxes results in fewer Navajo youth starting to smoke and more Navajo adults quitting, while at the same time providing substantial revenue to fund important health, including commercial tobacco prevention, programs.

In addition, we are pleased to see that the Amendment includes increases in taxes on all commercial tobacco products, not just cigarettes, as well as a new tax on ecigarettes. Across the nation, e-cigarettes have been the predominant tobacco products used by youth for years. According to the Navajo YRBS survey (2017), "40% of our Navajo Youth have tried e-cigarettes in their lifetime." Research also shows that increases in prices on these other commercial tobacco products will reduce youth use.

Furthermore, the health gains from the tax increases in the proposed Amendment will be amplified by directing some of the revenue to the health department for commercial tobacco prevention efforts. These funds will provide much-needed support in protecting the health and wellbeing of the Navajo people and visitors in the Navajo Nation into the future, especially for our youth and young adults.

In our experience with the Air is Life Health Coalition, their work educating the Navajo people about the dangers of commercial tobacco smoke and use is critical to prosperity of the Navajo Nation. This public health initiative has created a positive and lasting change toward living in harmony for the Navajo people, especially as we move forward from the COVID-19 pandemic. The proposed Amendment will further the work in public health and most importantly will save lives.

In closing, the Campaign wholeheartedly supports the proposed Amendment, "Amendment of the Navajo Nation Commercial Tobacco Tax of 2023." We appreciate the continuous efforts to broadly elevate the health of the Navajo people. If there is anything more that we can do to support this important public health proposal, please let us know. Dear Madam Speaker Crystalyne Curley,

Good afternoon. I'm writing this letter in conjunction with Navajo Nation Legislation # 0145-24.

I just wanted to comment on this legislation as it doesn't appear that much research has been done on this subject of tobacco taxation.

First, the State of Arizona Luxury Tax assesses the initial tax on tobacco products. The State of Arizona applies its luxury tax at the distributor level, before the product is delivered to the retail store. Since approximately 95% of all tobacco sales are cigarettes, I'll focus on cigarette sales. At the State of Arizona level, the current Luxury Tax on cigarettes is \$.10 per cigarette or \$2.00 per pack or \$20 per carton. In the State law, there is an exemption for sales of tobacco that occur within Indian Country. The exemption reduces the state Luxury Tax on cigarettes to \$1.00 per pack if the Tribe/Community has a similar tax in place.

Distributors add a taxing stamp to each pack of cigarettes before the packs of cigarettes are distributed to the retailer. Distributors know exactly which of the 4 stamps are to be placed on the packs based upon the ownership and location of the retail store. There is a blue, red, yellow and green stamp. Blue Stamp is the most used stamp. This is for cigarettes sold at stores located off the Indian reservations. Red Stamp cigarette packs represent packs that have the reduced State of Arizona Luxury Tax applied and Yellow Stamp cigarette packs represent cigarettes delivered to stores owned by members of the reservation that has a tribal tobacco tax in place. Green Stamp represents cigarettes delivered to stores owned by members of the reservation and sold to reservation members. Green and Yellow stamps are rarely used.

The Tribal/Community cigarette tax has to be at least \$1 per pack. The Navajo Nation currently qualifies for that exemption. Stores that are owned and operated by members of the respective Indian reservation in which the sale occurs receive either the Red or Yellow tax stamps.

This exemption was put in place to allow more tobacco sales to occur on Indian Tribal/Community lands. In other tribal Community's, tobacco sales are extremely high. There is one tribal Community in the valley that generates over \$10 million in tobacco tax revenue annually. Since the cigarette luxury tax is \$1 per pack, this Community basically has about 10 million packs of cigarettes sold annually. On the other hand, the Navajo Nation only has about 178,000 packs of cigarettes delivered to stores on the Navajo Nation annually.

Per the Office of the Navajo Tax Commission (ONTC) web page, the Navajo Tobacco Tax is the second lowest of the seven Navajo taxes enacted and collected. In Fiscal Year 2023, ONTC only collected \$178,000 in Tobacco Tax revenue. Thus, to increase the tax rate up to \$2.50 per pack would theoretically increase the tax revenue up to \$450,000. However, smokers are very price conscious consumers. As such, I believe that the 178,000 packs sold in FY 2023 would actually drop dramatically with a 150% increase in the tax.

Theoretically, Council would accomplish one thing, reduced tobacco sales on the Navajo Nation. However, the second goal of actually reducing smoking would probably not be accomplished. With an additional \$1.50 added to the price of cigarette packs on Navajo, consumers will just

load up off Navajo. The third goal of generating additional money for NDOH program will be minimal. This same goal could be accomplished right now by just amending the Section 808 right now, without the increase in tax rate.

Secondly, I'm not understanding the tax law that is being proposed by this legislation. Do you? In Section 803 (6), it states "on any other tobacco product not subject to tax under the preceding paragraphs 1-5, 22% of the retail price". What does that mean? Is this where the Luxury Tax on vaping products will occur? If so, this is not the way to apply the Luxury Tax, upon the retail price. Applying a tax on the "retail price" occurs under the Navajo Sales Tax, not the Luxury Tax. To make it simple, it would be best to tax the vaping product at the wholesale price, not the retail price. There is a difference. The Tobacco Tax applies the tax to the wholesale price of the product. The retail price then increases with the addition of the Luxury Tax. It'll be difficult for the distributor to apply the Luxury Tax on vaping products at the retail price.

Thirdly, please provide for additional length of time, 3 months to 6 months for implementation. The Office of the Navajo Tax Commission has to prepare the tax forms, work with Finance to set up an account for the funds and provide public education to the retail community on this change.

Next, what is "Section Four" about? Is the Navajo Nation applying an additional 22% tax on vaping products? I thought this issue was address in Section 803 (6). Why is this proposal deleting the licensing section and adding another tax section. This does not make any sense. Navajo Nation Council will need to address this issue.

Lastly, the Navajo Nation Council should know that the vaping products are taxed under the Navajo Nation Sales tax. However, the Navajo Nation Sales Tax does not apply to Tobacco Products Tax. So by placing "vaping products" under the Tobacco Products Tax, it will currently be exempt from the Navajo Sales Tax. As such, the Navajo Nation Council should look to amend the Navajo Nation Sales tax, Section 609 (B) (2). By simply deleting subsection 609 (B) (2), Tobacco products will become taxable under the Navajo Sales Tax. When I was the Executive Director of ONTC, I tried to get this before the Navajo Nation Council back in 2022; but Department of Justice was extremely slow in reviewing this simple amendment before I departed from the Navajo Nation.

Now, the Navajo Nation Council is most definitely within its ability to amend the Navajo Tax Code. However, in this case, the justification used is very questionable. The increase of the tax rate will only drive sales off the Navajo Nation. Both Arizona and New Mexico currently apply lower Luxury Tax rates on cigarettes. Secondly, the State of Arizona does not apply the Luxury Tax upon vaping products. As such, consumers will just purchase their tobacco off the Navajo Nation, than pay the additional \$.50 per pack.
